

Ad orientem worship at St. Cecilia

For some time now, the Mass has been celebrated at St. Cecilia in a manner which is not common in the local Church. This orientation *ad orientem* or "towards the East" has its foundation in ancient tradition of turning towards the direction of the rising sun, and thus the Resurrected Christ. One faces a "liturgical East" even if the physical orientation of the church in question does not actually face that cardinal direction. Furthermore, it is meant to foster an understanding that the priest celebrant is praying with the people in the same direction as them, and they are joining in the sacrifice together. While Mass is also celebrated *versus populum* or "towards the people" in most congregations, we should never consider either orientation to be somehow superior or inferior. Both orientations are modes of worship permitted by the laws of the Church and can be valued individually for the richness of their symbolism.

With this in mind, emphasizing that both orientations are valid and neither are deleterious to the devotion of the faithful, the 3:30 PM Mass on Saturday at St. Cecilia will from be celebrated *versus populum*. The 8 AM, 10 AM, and 8:15 PM Masses will remain as they are.

Let us never lose sight of the real object of the Mass, irrespective of altar orientation — the representation of the incredible sacrifice of Calvary and the real presence of Jesus Christ, Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity on our altar.

Heart of Jesus, salvation of those who trust in Thee, have mercy on us.

TOGETHER

As we dive into the third year of the Eucharistic Revival, let us reinvigorate our participation at Mass and invite those who have wandered from our fold to return. Join us these next five weeks as we reflect on key components of the Mass and pray that our worship may be pleasing to God in Heaven as we give entirely of ourselves, together.

Presence: Physical vs. Virtual

"We too are gathered round the table of the Lord, the table of the Eucharistic sacrifice, in which he once again gives us his Body and makes present the one sacrifice of the Cross. It is in listening to his word, in nourishing ourselves with his Body and his Blood that he moves us on from being a multitude to being a community, from anonymity to communion. The Eucharist is the sacrament of communion that brings us out of individualism so that we may follow him together, living out our faith in him." -Pope Francis, May 30, 2013



I would venture to guess that many, if not most, of us have heard the popular Emily Dickinson poem, "Some keep the Sabbath going to Church." In it, Dickinson shares a witty and concise reflection on how she experiences a more profound type of worship by herself out in nature than packed into a stuffy, restrictive chapel. Her words that express an escapist and nonconforming view of faith in many ways have come to foreshadow conversations in our modern world about religion. How often do we hear interviews with public figures where they assert that they identify as "spiritual but not religious"? Or perhaps we have heard friends and family members double down on how they don't need to attend Sunday services because they can worship God anywhere since "my relationship with God is between me and Him." I don't mean to suggest that we can't or shouldn't experience a profound sense of spiritual communion with God when we take in that beautiful view of the Rocky Mountains or feel the ocean breeze at the shore, nor would I contend that we're limited in where we can reflect and offer up prayers to our Lord. In fact, it seems a great sign if we find ourselves being drawn into moments of gratitude toward God on a regular basis. The problem is, however, when we believe we can adequately substitute something else in the place of our presence in Church on Sundays.

In the last four years, perhaps the biggest temptation toward this phenomena is not of a transcendental nature but rather a virtual one. We all remember the days of the pandemic when we communed in our living rooms gathered around the television to watch one of our priests celebrate Mass in an empty church. Perhaps you did your best to stand, sit, and kneel at all the designated times; you may have even dressed up to retain some sense of normalcy and pursue proper reverence. How joyful it was to be once again able to gather together in full communion and finally share once again the gift of Christ's Body and Blood in the Eucharist. Sadly, however, a significant portion of our Catholic flock did not return. Many are still participating only virtually and others may have ceased altogether making Mass the focus of their Sunday morning. There can be many reasons for this and we have attempted to highlight some of these in this column: a lack of understanding of the Mass itself, doubt in the Real Presence, diminished conviction in the importance of weekly attendance, or forgetting the Lord's desire to be physically united with us. Of course, there are unique reasons that go beyond these, but regardless, the point is that this is an absence that we feel as the Body of Christ and that Christ also experiences as the Head. One of the most beautiful things about our Catholic faith is how central the belief of interconnectedness among the faithful is. For example, we emphasize intercessory prayer and the desire of Mary and the saints to help bring our prayers to God the Father in Heaven, and an important spiritual work of mercy is to pray for the dead, namely those in purgatory. This individualistic approach to Christianity that might seem enticingly experimental in Emily Dickinson's philosophy and that lurks as a temptation to us in modern culture quickly begins to feel hollow by comparison when juxtaposed with the rich love at the heart of these teachings and how they are lived out in our parishes.

As Pope Francis says, during the Mass God "moves us on from being a multitude to being a community, from anonymity to communion." It is time for us to look out beyond the doors of our beautiful churches (which I dare say Emily Dickinson never would have wanted to leave), and seek out those in the multitude who have wandered. We must remind them what they may have forgotten: that Christ Himself is waiting for them in the gift of His Body and Blood and desires to be united with them each week. We must demonstrate our love for them and desire for their true good in spite of what might feel uncomfortable in the moment. We must not let them forsake communion for anonymity and encounter with the Creator for admiration of what He has created. In the Mass alone on this side of heaven will we all discover the source, the summit, the Real Presence of Christ, our true good, and the perfect place of rest and refocus for the life that God has called us to live.

How is your experience coming to Mass in person and in our beautiful churches different from online? Who can I invite back to Mass, whether they have been going online or haven't been going at all?
