MERRY CHRISTMAS



"'TWAS THE NIGHT


BEFORE CHRISTMAS

... and all through the house, not a creature was stirring, not even a mouse."

I'm sure we can all recite the rest of this iconic poem without hesitation. It's one of the most beloved Christmas books of all time. First published in 1823, most families gather together sometime during the Christmas season to read and recite it together; it's a tradition for many families across our country. I know this poem is ingrained in my own memory, thanks to many years of reading it with my family. The magic of the poem would have my sister and I squealing in delightful anticipation of the day to come. The details of Santa's visit still brings up feelings of the wonder and awe that I'm sure most kids associate with the magic of Christmas. But how often do we think of this poem in relation to our Catholic Faith and the real reason for Christmas? The poem mentions many joyful secular traditions- the stockings hung by the chimney, Jolly Old St. Nick arrives in a sleigh pulled by flying reindeerand while these are fun traditions that make children light up like a Christmas Tree, it's actually a poem very rooted in Catholicism. St. Nicholas, as we know, was a real man, living in modern day Turkey in the 4th Century. He was known for coming in the night to leave people anonymous gifts. He was a pious man, brought up by devout Christian parents, who went on to play a large role

in combating the Arian Heresy during the Council of Nicea. The Santa Clause we know from the poem was born from this Catholic Saint. His spirit of generosity is carried through the Santa Clause we know today. We all know that the birth of Christ is why we celebrate Christmas; it's easy, however, to get caught up in the secular traditions and forget this. By reading Twas the Night Before Christmas with your family, and helping your children to understand the Catholic roots of Santa Clause, you may find that your family will easily be able to keep Christ and Catholic traditions in Christmas.

Ways you can contribute

CASH GIFTS

A cash gift of any amount is a convenient and popular way to show your faithful support for the church and our ministries. If you itemize, the full amount of your gift qualifies for a 2024 charitable income tax deduction. Make certain your check is dated 2024 and received or postmarked no later than December 31, 2024, to receive a deduction this year.

MAKE A GIFT WITH YOUR IRA

Congress made the qualified charitable distribution (QCD) a permanent rule in 2015. It allows owners of a traditional IRA to exclude RMDs from their adjusted gross income (AGI) if they give the money to an approved charity, also known as a qualified charitable organization. The QCD rule allows you to give the amount you donate from your IRA directly to charity without ever receiving it as income. Therefore, you pay no income taxes on the gift. The transfer generates neither taxable income nor a tax deduction, so you benefit even if you do not itemize your deductions. Since the gift doesn't count as income, it can reduce your annual income level. This may also help lower your Medicare premiums and decrease the amount of Social Security that is subject to tax. Best of all, you can start taking QCDs at age 70½; you don't have to wait until you hit 73.

WISE TAX PLANNING

Making extra gifts or accelerating future gifts into the 2024 tax year can enable an itemized income tax deduction. The standard deduction threshold for 2024 is \$29,200 for joint filers, \$21,900 for heads of households and \$14,600 for singles (\$1,950/person 65+, \$3,900 if joint return, \$1,950 if unmarried). If your total deductions are less than those amounts, you won't be able to deduct any charitable gifts. An extra year-end gift may add just enough to allow you to take advantage of your full itemized deduction. Many tax-wise donors accelerate contributions for the coming year to enable itemization at least every other year.

SCHOLARSHIP GRANTING ORGANTIZATION (SGO)

SUPPORT OUR SCHOOLS! A donation to the Archdiocese of Cincinnati Scholarship Granting Organization (SGO), directing the funding to St. Mary School or St. Cecilia School, is a great opportunity to direct state funding that would otherwise be paid in taxes. There is no cost to your family individually, as the donation generates a dollar-for-dollar tax credit of \$750 per donor (up to \$1500 for a couple) to be used against Ohio tax liability. This fund will help create additional scholarship funding for St. Mary or St. Cecilia that would otherwise be funded through the general fund. **To participate, please visit catholicbestchoice.org/sgo**






UPCOMING EVENTS


